

THE PROCESS OF CUTTING DOWN A 51' FOOT TREE





Dave starts by removing the limbs from the bottom up The bucket truck allows him to get most of the way to the top.




A rope and pulley system was used to control the fall of the two upper leader sections.

Planting Amaryllis Bulbs In Containers - About As Easy As It Gets



- Amaryllis bulbs are graded by size; generally, a larger bulb means more flower stalks and blooms.
- For a starting point, plant amaryllis bulbs about eight weeks before you want them to bloom.
- Bulbs can be ordered online or purchased at big box stores and nurseries in late October or early November for blooming around the December holidays.

How to Plant

Amaryllis bulbs benefit from soaking their roots in room-temperature water for 12-24 hours prior to planting. This produces a healthier and more vigorous plant that blooms faster. Soak just the roots, not the bulb. Use a water glass or other container that's a little smaller than the bulb to allow the roots to dangle in the water without the bulb falling inside and getting stuck.

You need a pot about 2 inches wider than the bulb with adequate drainage holes. If your bulb did not come with a puck of coir, grab some fresh potting soil. Fill the bottom of the pot with enough soil so that the bulb's top third will be exposed. Set the bulb onto the soil. Then fill the rest of the pot, again leaving the top third of the bulb exposed. Water thoroughly, (if coir was used it will be wet so give it a day or two before watering) and set it in a bright, warm spot. You'll likely see growth begin in a week or less.

If the bulb had already sprouted when you removed it from the box, just give it time. It will turn green and begin growing in a few days. Turn the pot daily so the flower stalk grows straight up. Amaryllis grow and bloom best with at least four hours of sunshine per day. Too much shade may prevent them from blooming again the following year. Let them soak up the light, even after blooming, to replenish the energy stored in the bulb for next year. Indoors, a grow light can be useful to produce the largest, healthiest plants.
